

CONFERENCE NOTES:

BIG OPENING WEEK MATCHUPS: The 2017 CAA Football season gets off to an exciting start with one of the league's most spirited rivalries, two contests pitting teams ranked in the Top 25 nationally, a pair of games with local bragging rights, and six matchups against FBS opponents. There are four games on Thursday, August 31, highlighted by the Battle for the Brice-Cowell Musket between conference foes Maine and New Hampshire, along with Delaware hosting in-state foe Delaware State. On Friday night, No. 7 Richmond takes on No. 3 Sam Houston State in a 7 p.m. game that was moved to Baylor University due to the flooding caused by Hurricane Harvey. Both the Spiders and Bearkats advanced to the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs a year ago. Saturday's six-game schedule includes No. 10/9 Villanova visiting No. 17 Lehigh and Towson hosting Morgan State in the Battle for Greater Baltimore.

CAA vs. FBS: There are six opening week games between CAA Football squads and FBS opponents. CAA Football has posted 34 victories over FBS foes in its history, including two last season as Richmond topped Virginia, 37-20, and UAlbany defeated Buffalo, 22-16. This year's opening week slate features Elon at Toledo and Rhode Island at Central Michigan on Thursday night, followed by James Madison at East Carolina, Stony Brook at No. 19 USF, William & Mary at Virginia and UAlbany at Old Dominion on Saturday. A complete list of CAA Football wins over FBS opponents can be found on Page 15 of this release.

CAA SUCCESS IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY: CAA Football teams went 24-7 in non-conference games against FCS opponents last season, which was the best winning percentage by an FCS conference.

FIVE CAA TEAMS RANKED IN PRESEASON NATIONAL POLL: Five of CAA Football's 12 teams are ranked among the top 25 nationally in the preseason STATS FCS Top 25 poll. Reigning national champion James Madison starts the 2017 season at No. 1, and is followed by No. 7 Richmond, No. 10 Villanova, No. 13 New Hampshire and No. 24 UAlbany. Four CAAFB teams are among the FCS Coaches Top 25 with No. 1 James Madison, No. 7 Richmond, No. 9 Villanova and No. 16 New Hampshire. Five other teams (Delaware, Maine, Stony Brook, Towson and William & Mary) received votes in at least one of the two polls.

FIVE FROM CAA ON NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR WATCH LISTS: CAA Football had five players named to the STATS FCS Preseason Player of the Year Watch Lists. UAlbany junior running back Elijah Ibitokun-Hanks, Richmond senior quarterback Kyle Lauletta and James Madison senior quarterback Bryan Schor made the Walter Payton Award Watch List, while James Madison senior defensive lineman Andrew Ankrah and Villanova senior safety Rob Rolle were on the Buck Buchanan Award Watch list.

JMU PICKED TO WIN CAA TITLE: James Madison, which returns 14 starters from last year's 14-1 team that captured the 2016 NCAA FCS National Championship, was the overwhelming choice to win the CAA Football title in 2017. Richmond, Villanova and New Hampshire, who also earned berths in the FCS playoffs a year ago, took the next three spots in the poll of coaches and media relations directors. Delaware was picked fifth, followed by UAlbany, William & Mary, Stony Brook, Maine, Towson, Elon and Rhode Island.

JMU'S SCHOR, VU'S ROLLE HEADLINE PRESEASON ALL-CAA TEAM: James Madison senior quarterback Bryan Schor was chosen as the CAA preseason Offensive Player of the Year, while Villanova senior safety Rob Rolle was selected as the CAA preseason Defensive Player of the Year in a vote of the league's head coaches and media relations directors. Schor, the 2016 CAA Offensive Player of the Year, led FCS in completion percentage (73.1%) and pass efficiency (186.2) last season. He threw for 3,022 yards and 29 TD's and also ran for 569 yards and 10 TD's. Rolle registered 63 tackles and topped the conference with seven interceptions. He also had five pass breakups, a fumble recovery and scored two defensive TD's. The entire preseason All-CAA team can be found on Page 11 of this release.

CAA PARTNERS WITH CBS SPORTS DIGITAL: The CAA has signed an agreement with CBS Sports Digital to stream a "Game of the Week" package on CollegeSportsLive.com. The 12-game package opens on Thursday with Maine at New Hampshire and all 12 teams will appear at least once during the season. Scott Sudikoff will handle the play-by-play duties and former NFL player Brandon Noble will work as the analyst.

CAA PLACES 14 ON PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA TEAM: A total of 14 CAA Football players from nine different teams were honored on the STATS preseason FCS All-America squad. Receiving first-team honors were UAlbany running back Elijah Ibitokun-Hanks, Stony Brook offensive lineman Timon Parris, James Madison offensive lineman Aaron Stinnie and Villanova safety Rob Rolle. Named to the second team were UAlbany fullback Anthony Manzo-Lewis, JMU defensive lineman Andrew Ankrah, Richmond kicker Griffin Trau, Towson kick returner Shane Simpson and Rhode Island all-purpose back Harold Cooper. Selected to the third team were Maine offensive lineman Jamil Demby, William & Mary offensive lineman Chris Durant, JMU tight end Jonathan Kloosterman, Richmond running back Deontez Thompson and JMU safety Raven Greene.

MULTIPLE TEAMS IN THE FCS PLAYOFFS: For the third year in a row, four CAA Football teams (James Madison, New Hampshire, Richmond and Villanova) were chosen to the NCAA Division I Football Championship field, and all four advanced to the second round in 2016. CAA Football has had multiple teams in the playoffs for 26 straight years and three or more teams in the playoff field for 11 years in a row. It was the ninth time in league history that at least four teams were chosen. CAA Football had a league-record five teams picked in 2007, 2008 and 2011.

PLAYOFF SUCCESS: James Madison became the sixth CAA Football member to capture the FCS National Championship last January when it defeated Youngstown State, 28-14. Since 2003, CAA Football has had a team in the FCS title game nine times, with five different teams winning national titles - Delaware (2003), JMU (2004, 2016), Richmond (2008) and Villanova (2009). CAA Football has had four different teams advance to the semifinals of the playoffs over the past four years - Towson (2013), New Hampshire (2014), Richmond (2015) and JMU (2016) - and 23 semifinalists overall.

NEW HAMPSHIRE EXTENDS PLAYOFF STREAK: New Hampshire earned a berth in the FCS playoffs for the 13th consecutive year in 2016, extending the longest active streak in the nation. Under coach Sean McDonnell, the Wildcats have recorded 13 straight winning seasons with double-digit victory totals in six of them. UNH had an incredible streak of 162 straight weeks ranked in the STATS FCS Top 25 poll from Sept. 6, 2004 until Oct. 12, 2015.

CAA WELCOMES NEW COACHES: Four CAA Football teams will have new head coaches this season, but three of them already have ties to the conference. Danny Rocco, who guided Richmond to the FCS playoffs for the past three seasons, is the new head coach at Delaware. Russ Huesman, who was the defensive coordinator at Richmond during its national championship run in 2008, returns as head coach of the Spiders after leading Chattanooga to three straight FCS playoff appearances. After 30 seasons as a member of the coaching staff at Villanova under legendary mentor Andy Talley, Mark Ferrante takes over as head coach of the Wildcats in 2017. Elon named Curt Cignetti as its new head coach after he posted an impressive a 53-17 mark in six seasons at Indiana (Pa.). He's also a former assistant to Nick Saban at Alabama.

With 243 career wins, he ranks second only to Columbia's Al Bagnoli (244) among active NCAA Division I coaches. His 109 victories in CAA Football are second only to Villanova's Andy Talley (142).

UALBANY**0-0 Overall/0-0 CAAFB**

- Return 16 starters from last year's 7-4 squad, including eight on defense.
- Junior RB Elijah Ibitokun-Hanks earned 3rd team All-America honors after running for 1,388 yards and 16 TD's last season. He ranked 4th in FCS in rushing (126.2 ypg) and 8th in scoring (8.7 ppg).
- Ibitokun-Hanks topped the 100-yard mark six times last season, including a program-record 298 yards vs. New Hampshire.
- Senior DL Malachi Hoskins made 82 tackles last season and led UAlbany in sacks (7), tackles for loss (11) and forced fumbles (3). He earned 2nd team All-CAA honors.
- UAlbany led the CAA and ranked 4th in FCS in TO margin (+16) last season.

- Safety Raven Greene made a team-high 6 interceptions last season and was also fourth on the team with 70 tackles.

DELAWARE**0-0 Overall/0-0 CAAFB**

- Danny Rocco begins his first season as the head coach at UD. Rocco compiled a 43-22 record at Richmond over the past five years and guided the Spiders to three straight FCS playoff appearances.

- Earnest Edwards ranked 24th in FCS in kick returns (24.5 avg.) and also caught 20 passes for 334 yards and 3 TD's.
