KEY STORYLINES

Fifteen months to the day of its last match, the Oregon soccer program gets the **Graeme Abel** era underway by hosting Gonzaga Sunday at 1 p.m. at Pape' Field.

- **Graeme Abel**, the Ducks' fourth head coach in the modern era (1996-present), brings a pair of World Cup championships with him to Eugene after serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team in 2015 and 2019.
- The Ducks return four of their top five goal scorers from last season: **Jordan Wormdahl** (7), **Zoe Hasenauer** (4), **Ally Cook** (3) and **Maya Hahn** (3).
- Oregon also welcomes Mountain West Player of the Year **Lexi Romero**, who transferred from Air Force following a freshman season in which she led the conference in goals (14) and points (33).
- During the offseason, the Ducks added the top goal scorer in the state of Oregon's history to the 2020 freshman class. **Callan Harrington** scored 133 goals in her career for Jesuit High School, one more than soccer Hall of Famer and U.S. National Team star Tiffeny Milbrett.
- Scoregon! Combined, **Callan Harrington** (Portland) and **Jordan Wormdahl** (Eugene) scored 200 goals in their Oregon high school careers. Adding in the scores by **Paige Alexander** (Salem), **Maggie Lacey** (Central Point), **Rosie Larsen** (West Linn) and **Mia Palmer**, (Portland), those six Ducks roster combined for more than 300 goals in their Oregon prep careers.
- The Ducks return three defensive starters: **Chai Cortez**, **Mia Palmer** and **Croix Soto**. Palmer has started 38 straight games.
- In the midfield, Oregon returns starters **Chardonay Curran**, **Zoe Hasenauer** and **Caitlin Shaw**.

WHAT'S NEW

Oregon begins the 2020-21 season with a new head coach, **Graeme Abel**. Also new to the staff are assistant coach **Rachael Doyle** and volunteer assistant **Thomas Osborne**. New on the field are six freshmen - GK **Leah Freeman**, D **Rosie Larsen**, F **Paige Alexander**, M **Brooke Schultz**, F **Callan Harrington** and M **Megan Rucker** - and two transfers **Madeline Gravante** (Florida) and **Lexi Romero** (Air Force).

GOAL-SCORERS RETURN FOR 2020-21 SEASASON

Of Oregon's 26 goals in 2019, 20 were scored by freshmen or sophomores. The Ducks will return 88 percent of their offense in 2020-21.

NET NOTES

The 2020-21 season marks the first time since 2015 that Oregon enters a season without a goalkeeper who has starting experience. The last time that happened followed the graduation of **Abby Steele** in 2014 when freshman **Halla Hinriksdottir** won the starting job in 2015.

WORMDAHL JOINS CLUB OF THREE

Junior forward **Jordan Wormdahl**, who led the team with seven goals in 2019, scored a goal in each of the Ducks' first four games last season. She became just the third player in program history to score a goal in four straight matches. The other two are all-Pac-10 first team selection **Jen Stoltenberg**, who scored in five straight contests during the 2010 season, and UO Hall of Famer **Michele Potestio**, who scored in four straight in 1980.

HASENAUER RECORD BOOK

Junior **Zoe Hasenauer** begins her junior season in tenth in UO career assists (9) and is knocking on the door of two other top-10 lists. She has 92 career shots (two away from the top 10) and 17 career points (10 away).

NOW THAT'S RECYCLING

Oregon is known for being a green campus, but this takes repurposing to another level. The athletic department has doubled the candle wattage of the stadium lights at Pape' Field with the addition of four new light towers that used to stand at historic Hayward Field. With Hayward Field undergoing a total reconstruction in advance of hosting the 2021 IAAF World Track & Field Championships, the athletic department was able to repurpose four of the light towers, which will make night games at Pape' Field brighter both in person and for those watching on television or online.

FORMER S-A PHIL KNIGHT PLEDGES \$500 MILLION FOR SCIENCE

UO graduate and former track and field student-athlete Phil Knight, the co-founder of Nike, and his wife Penny made a half-a-billion dollar commitment to scientific research at the University of Oregon. It is the largest gift ever bestowed to a public university. "This act of philanthropy from Penny and Phil Knight is breathtaking," said University of Oregon President Michael Schill. "This is a seminal moment for the University of Oregon, an inflection point that will shape

the trajectory of the university and this state for the next century and beyond." The Knight's \$500 million donation will fund the construction - currently underway - of a new science complex on the Eugene campus. Research at the new site will focus on life sciences such as biology, microbiology, biochemistry and other disciplines.

Graeme Abel was named the fourth women's soccer head coach of the modern era on Dec. 30, 2019.

He comes to Oregon after serving as an assistant coach for the 2015 and 2019 FIFA World Cup champion U.S. Women's National Team.

"Leading the women's soccer program at the University of Oregon was something that was too good of an opportunity to pass up," said Abel. "I have been very fortunate over the past five years to work alongside both world class athletes and coaches who continually set new standards for women's soccer."

Abel joined the staff of U.S. head coach Jill Ellis as an assistant coach in February of 2015 and helped Team USA navigate through seven World Cup matches, eventually setting numerous records in defeating Japan, 5-2, in the championship match to win the United States' first World Cup title in 16 years.

The team went 6-0-1 during the course of the tournament, which was played on artificial turf in Canada, and allowed opponents just three goals.

The 2019 World Cup in France marked one of the most dominant performances by any nation. Team USA went undefeated, 7-0, and outscored the opposition 26-3. The Americans defeated the Netherlands 2-0 in the championship match to claim back-to-back World Cup titles.

Abel was also on the staff of the U.S. Women's National Teams that won the 2016 and 2018 CONCACAF titles and was also part of the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro.

Abel worked extensively with numerous women's national youth programs during his time with Team USA. He was an assistant for the U-20 U.S. Women's National Team at the 2016 FIFA U-20 Women's World

Cup in Papa New Guinea and also served as an assistant for the U-17 U.S. Women's National Team from 2012 to 2015.

Prior to joining U.S. Soccer, Abel spent eight seasons coaching collegiately. He was an associate head coach for Oklahoma's 2014 NCAA Tournament team, part of his two stints with the Sooners from 2008 to 2010 and 2012 to 2015. He helped lead Washington State to the 2011 NCAA Tournament during his tenure as an assistant coach from 2010 to 2012. Before Oklahoma and Washington State, Abel worked three years as an assistant for Nevada from 2005 to 2007.

Abel began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 2004 at his alma mater, Brescia University in Owensboro, Ky.

During his youth soccer years in Great Britain, Abel was on the books at Everton FC from 1994 to 1997. He also played with Stockport County FC from 1997 to 1999 before coming to the United States to attend college at Lindsey Wilson College in Columbia, Ky. He was an NAIA All-American as a freshman at Lindsey Wilson and named the 1999 NAIA National Tournament MVP after leading the Blue Raiders to the national championship.

In 2001, he went back to England to play for Chester City FC, but then returned to college, this time at Brescia where he was once again an NAIA All-American and a two-time Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Association Player of the Year.

Abel has a USSF "B" Coaching License and an NSCAA Advanced National Diploma.

Abel and his wife, the former Katie Schoene, who played collegiately under Tara Erickson at Portland State and was a volunteer assistant coach under Erickson at Oregon in 2007, have two children, a 5-year-old son, Kian, and a 3-year-old daughter, Lila.
